### MAKE SURE YOUR CHILD IS NOT ON THE DISTRICT'S CHRONICALLY ABSENT LIST

Any student absence for any reason, including excused absences, causes your student to miss valuable instruction time. Baltimore City Schools follows the State of Maryland requirements for reporting absences. If your child misses 10% or more of any portion of the school year, she/he will be put on the chronically absent list for that period of time. For example, if school has been in session 50 days and your child has been absent 5 days, that is 10% of the year so far and she/he would be put on the chronically absent list.

Although even excused absences count towards the chronically absent total, communication with the school is key. Every time your child is out, make sure your child's teacher knows by sending a note in Dojo. Please review the chart to fully understand when your child will be considered chronically absent.

#### **TOP NEWS STORIES**

#### HHA IS THE TOP 4 STAR SCHOOL (PSST, CHECK OUT OUR PERCENTILE RANKINGS)

Congratulations to the staff and students for their hard work in achieving this remarkable accomplishment! Of the approximately 1,500 schools in Maryland, only 91 have earned a Five-Star rating. Among City Schools, Poly High School is the sole Five-Star school. Notably, HHA sends dozens of students to Poly every year, allowing the school to take a small share of pride in their continued success.

This year, there are 446 Four-Star schools in Maryland, 11 of which are located in Baltimore City. HHA staff proudly note that the school is the highest-performing institution in the city. Even more significant than the star rating is HHA's percentile rank. The elementary grades performed in the 86<sup>th</sup> percentile statewide, while the middle school achieved an impressive 97<sup>th</sup> percentile rank. Let's go, HHA! Check out the HHA MSDE Report Card.

#### INTERNATIONAL BREAKFAST

This year's traditional International Breakfast was a resounding success, bringing our school community together in a celebration of culture, food, and holiday cheer. The PreK and kindergarten students stole the spotlight with their adorable and heartwarming performances of holiday songs, filling the room with joy and spreading festive cheer. It was a beautiful reminder of the unity and diversity that make our school so special.

We extend a special thank you to the parents who generously contributed delicious dishes from around the world. These contributions added a rich variety of flavors and traditions, making the celebration even more meaningful and memorable. A heartfelt thank you to Ms. Castelan and our dedicated staff members, who worked tirelessly before, during, and after the event to ensure everything ran smoothly. Your hard work and attention to detail were evident in every aspect of the event. We are also grateful to Mr. Lee and Mr. Farber for their insightful and engaging presentations about Hanukkah and Kwanzaa. Your efforts to share these important cultural

#### **CLASS SIZE**

Large class sizes are a pressing concern for everyone at HHA, as the school is experiencing significant overcrowding. It has been a consistent announcement for the last several years that no one residing outside the attendance area should expect admission for the foreseeable future. The school's staffing and programming budget requires at least 860 students to function effectively but does not necessitate enrollment exceeding 940 students. In other words, while dipping below 860 students would jeopardize staffing and programming, exceeding the necessary number of students puts an undue strain on resources. Each student represents a financial impact of over \$10,000 annually, with funding determined by a complex formula that fluctuates year by year. The school prioritizes conservative budgeting to maintain stability for staff, parents, and students over the long term, avoiding cycles of over-staffing and subsequent layoffs.

Through September 30, 2026, HHA will honor its commitment to admitsiblings of current students, regardless of where families reside within Baltimore City. This long-standing policy, designed to keep families with young children together, will have a diminishing impact on class sizes as no new students are admitted via the lottery in coming years. One indicator of a healthy school community is when staff members choose to enroll their own children at the school. At HHA, any staff member who wishes to do so is permitted to enroll their child. This year, kindergarten enrollment is among the smallest, with just 90 students across three homerooms. The school hopes this trend in lower grades continues, keeping enrollment at 30 or fewer students in each of the 27 K-8 homerooms. However, approximately 20 homerooms currently have over 30 students, with some 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> grade classes exceeding 35 students in certain content areas.

Key considerations regarding class size include:

- PreK classes are capped at 20 students each, but no contractual cap exists for K-8 classes due to the school's status as a neighborhood-zoned school.
- Families living within the attendance area are guaranteed enrollment.
- Students admitted via the lottery in prior years or those who moved out of zone but remain within Baltimore City are allowed to continue attending HHA.
- No currently enrolled student may be transferred to another school as long as they reside in Baltimore City.

Historically, 2-6 students per grade level leave each year due to relocations outside the county or state. However, with HHA's growing reputation, more families are moving into the attendance zone. One of HHA's goals is to staff all 29 homerooms (including PreK) with highly qualified teachers and maintain class sizes between 28-32 students. In kindergarten and 1<sup>st</sup> grade, assistant teachers reduce the adult-to-student ratio to approximately 1:15. The school is also exploring the addition of three or four assistant teachers in overcrowded grades to further support teachers and students.

To mitigate the challenges of large class sizes, HHA continues to:

- Budget for full-time assistant teachers in kindergarten and 1st grade.
- Utilize pull-out services for talent development, gifted and advanced programs, special education, ESOL, and music practices, which often significantly reduce class sizes during those times.
- Employ six full-time substitute teachers to cover more than 850 teacher absences annually, as well as provide coverage for IEP and 504 meetings. This commitment ensures classes are not split or other parts of the day disrupted when a teacher is absent.

Class size has been a frequent topic of discussion at monthly School Family and Community Council meetings this year. ### VISIT AND TOUR WITH KURT L. SCHMOKE, PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY OF BALTIMORE

HHA had the honor of welcoming former Baltimore City Mayor and current University of Baltimore President Kurt L. Schmoke last month at an LGP Community Circle, where he delivered remarks. His visit was part of an initiative led by **Voices for Restorative Schools** (voicesforrestorativeschools.org), an organization advocating for the benefits of restorative practices in schools.

Restorative practices have been shown to enhance student performance, teaching, and learning when fully implemented. Legislation supporting this initiative is currently pending for the 2025 legislative session in Annapolis.



#### GET YOUR FAMILY BACK IN THE GROOVE

After a busy yet hopefully relaxing holiday season, students and staff are returning to the comfort of routine. Parents are encouraged to ensure that their children reestablish a consistent sleep schedule and arrive at school by 8:00 a.m. each day, ready to learn. As a reminder, second-quarter grades close toward the end of January. Parents should check with their children and teachers to identify any missing or incomplete assignments that need to be submitted before the quarter ends. #### NO PETS, PLEASE!

This is a reminder that pets are strictly prohibited on school property. While it is acceptable to walk by with a pet on the way

to or from the park, pets are not allowed during drop-off or pick-up times. The rule is in place to ensure the safety and comfort of all students, as some may be scared of or allergic to certain animals. When one person brings a pet during school hours, it may encourage others to do the same, leading to an overwhelming number of pets on the premises. #### Don'T BE DANGEROUS!

Our students are in danger when any car double parks or stops to let children out in the middle of the road, especially on the other side of the road in front of the school. Stopping in the middle of the road impedes traffic and results in cars swerving around the parked car, which causes an incredibly dangerous situation and puts our children at risk. There have been several close calls reported online and to HHA. Not only is double parking illegal and subject to an immediate \$260+ fine but the pain and suffering that an injured child, their family, and the person who did not see the child dart out into traffic would be traumatizing for all parties. Just don't do it! Please park your car and walk to drop off and pick up. Always follow Ishmael's directions and the other crossing guards as they work to keep everyone safe and make things efficient.

#### **News from the Baltimore Curriculum Project**



Last month, the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) released its annual star ratings for public schools, which are based on various indicators, including academic achievement, student growth, progress in closing achievement gaps, and overall school climate. When the pandemic began, schools across the country faced significant challenges that affected performance, including disruptions to in-person learning and difficulties with remote instruction. Schools in Baltimore City,

where many students come from low-income families, were particularly impacted. As a result, many schools in the area experienced a decline in their star ratings during the early years following the pandemic.

However, the story of the Baltimore Curriculum Project's (BCP) six neighborhood conversion charter schools is one of recovery and resilience. Since 2022, all six BCP schools have increased their total points earned in the Star Rankings, with some making significant strides that resulted in earning an additional star. This remarkable progress is a testament to the dedication of principals, faculty, staff, and parents, as well as the quality and effectiveness of the BCP program.

BCP is pleased to share that Wolfe Street Academy and City Springs Elementary/Middle School, two of the six BCP schools, have increased their Maryland Star Rating for 2023 - 2024. Congratulations to all our schools for your ongoing growth and improvement!

#### **GRADES PREK - 4 TEAM NEWS**

#### **PREK**

Ms. Klenk and Ms. Kaminaris: Welcome back from winter break! A big thank you to all the parents who attended or donated food items for the PreK winter holiday celebration. Students had a wonderful time reading *The Gingerbread Man* and decorating gingerbread houses with families. As everyone settles back into routines this month, please remember the importance of being in school on time every day. Students are marked late after 8:10 am. If your child is sick, please call the front office or message your classroom teacher to inform them so the absence can be marked as excused. In January, students will focus on animals, with an emphasis on winter animals and their habitats, such as the Arctic and tundra. Additionally, they will review numbers 1-5 and begin to explore two-dimensional and three-dimensional shapes. By the end of the unit, students should be able to describe, compare, and identify basic shapes.

Please ensure your child has a **labeled** coat to wear to school. Throughout the winter months, students will continue to go outside twice a day, weather permitting. Students do not stay inside solely because it is cold (unless temperatures drop to extreme or below-freezing levels). It is essential that students bring winter gear to stay comfortable during these outdoor periods, which last about 20 minutes each time. Everyone is excited to continue to work with your child in the new year and look forward to a productive and enjoyable month!

#### **KINDERGARTEN**

Ms. Maciel, Ms. Wallis and Ms. Villa Parker: Students had an exciting month in December, filled with learning and fun! They explored new sounds, practiced counting and writing numbers 1–20, identified rhyming pairs, and discussed various holiday traditions. In math, students learned about ordering numbers, comparing sets, and working with number bonds. In reading, they will continue to learn new sounds, read short stories, and answer comprehension questions. Please encourage your child to read their assigned reading book nightly and sign their reading log if they have received one. In Core Knowledge, students learned about different holiday traditions from around the world. They also enjoyed participating in the International Breakfast on December 20<sup>th</sup>, where they performed holiday songs. Additionally, they went on a walking field trip to see the Highlandtown Train Garden. Looking ahead to January, students will enjoy a special presentation about dental hygiene and the importance of taking care of their teeth. As the weather gets colder, please ensure that all winter items (coats, gloves, hats, etc.) are labeled with your child's first and last name. A helpful skill for students to practice at home is zipping and unzipping their coats independently. Please ensure your child comes to school dressed warmly and is able to fasten their own coats and tie their own shoes. They would like to also extend a special thank you to the PTO for fulfilling the teacher wish list items. The students are enjoying these new additions to their daily activities. Additionally, a big thank you to the parents who accompanied the students on the Highlandtown Train Garden field trip in December. The students had a wonderful time exploring the train garden and identifying familiar places and characters. As a reminder, please ensure your student brings a healthy snack each day, as they have a late lunch period. Also, be sure to dress your student appropriately for the cold weather. All families are encouraged to check their student's folders each night and to regularly review updates on ClassDojo for the latest school and classroom information. Happy 2025!

#### GRADE 3

**Reading – Ms. Knudsen**: Students continue to use text evidence to justify their answers, develop detailed paragraphs, and identify root words in vocabulary examples. They recently enjoyed an in-school presentation from AquaPartners, where they learned about the adaptations and habitats of Eastern Shore animals.

Language/Social Studies - Ms. Ahearn Jensen: Students are working hard! They are learning about the global trade market and how it connects different countries. Keep up the great work!

Math - Mr. Bradbury: Students have completed Unit 4 and are now beginning their work on the fraction's unit. Families may notice that their student has brought home a new workbook (3B). The class has skipped ahead to Unit 9 but will eventually return to Units 5 through 8. Parents and guardians are encouraged to check their child's agenda book nightly, as there should be something written in it each evening. Additionally, over 20 students have mastered all of the times tables and were rewarded with an ice cream treat during lunch. It is expected that many more students will achieve this milestone before the end of the second quarter.

Ms. Smith: Students completed the division and multiplication unit in math. They learned how to solve two-step word problems and even wrote their own. In social studies, they explored how various groups of people emigrated to the United States and practiced taking detailed notes. In reading, they engaged with a variety of social studies and science content and began exploring the art of poetry writing. The class has been performing well with their checkouts. Ms. Smith is very proud of their progress. Students also enjoyed an in-school field trip with AquaPartners, where they learned about habitats and had the opportunity to examine and touch a variety of fascinating aquatic animals. To wrap up the month, the class celebrated their excellent behavior with a fun board game day.

#### GRADE 4

Reading – Ms. Conrad: Students have been working diligently! In reading:

- The Crocodiles (Conrad) are reading the fantasy story *The Cat That Walked by Himself* and are practicing summarizing while distinguishing between fact and fantasy.
- The Sharks (Shortman) are reading *Sara Crewe* by Frances Hodgson Burnett and focusing on identifying main ideas and supporting details in passages.
- The Goldfish (Green) are about to begin Beauty and the Beast, where they will work on identifying themes and supporting details.

Language/Social Studies - Ms. Green: Social studies is coming to an end, making way for science to begin this month. Students have been learning about the events leading up to the American Revolution, focusing on the tensions between the colonists, the king, and British soldiers. They participated in an interactive choose-your-own-adventure game to decide whether they would align as loyalists or patriots in 1770s Boston. Additionally, they analyzed historical documents to explore multiple perspectives on the issue of declaring independence. Science will kick off at the end of the month with the first unit: Soils, Rocks, and Landforms.

Math – Ms. Shortman: The Crocodiles and Goldfish are working on Unit 3: Fractions, which covers equivalent fractions, simplifying fractions, adding and subtracting fractions with like denominators, and converting mixed numbers and improper fractions. Their first portfolio project, the Fraction Feast, is coming up soon. In this project, students will create a meal or dessert plate to add fractions up to one whole. The Unit 3 test will be held this month. The Sharks are completing Unit 4: Fraction Operations, which focuses on adding and subtracting unlike fractions, working with mixed numbers and improper fractions, and multiplying fractions by whole numbers. The Unit 4 test is also scheduled for January.

#### GRADES 5 - 8 TEAM NEWS

#### GRADE 5

Reading – Ms. Pellegrini-Gaither: The new year is off to a great start!

- The Robins and Owls are continuing their novel study of Walk Two Moons. The students will focus on informational writing and literary analysis, culminating in a five-paragraph literary analysis essay at the end of the novel.
- The Pandas are currently reading *Sara Crewe*. They are working on reading fluency, comprehension, vocabulary, and figurative language. This novel will serve as the basis for their next portfolio project: a four-paragraph literary essay.

Science – Ms. Ruppenthal: Students are excited to further explore the relationship between the Earth and the Sun. This month, they will enhance their observational and critical thinking skills by studying topics such as Earth's rotation, revolution, and the Sun's influence on climate and seasons. Hands-on experiments and interactive activities will help students visualize concepts like daylight variation and the water cycle. Through group projects, they will develop communication and collaboration skills as they share findings and present their understanding.

**Math – Ms. O'Connor:** After working on adding and subtracting fractions with unlike units, students have started to learn how to find the least common denominator. This foundational skill will continue to be practiced throughout fifth grade and into middle school. Before winter break, students completed a project on the Egyptian number system, discovering its similarities to our own. Following their work on adding and subtracting fractions with unlike denominators, the class will move on to multiplying and dividing fractions.

#### **GRADE 6**

**Humanities – Mr. Farber:** Students are hard at work on their National History Day (NHD) projects, which are due on January 17<sup>th</sup>. They are finalizing their research and annotated bibliographies and will soon begin to create their websites or exhibits. The class will briefly pause their study of *Romeo and Juliet*, which they have been reading for homework, and will resume it after NHD is complete.

Science – Ms. Poole: Ms. Poole hopes you had a wonderful winter break and are refreshed and ready to begin 2025! Students will continue to explore the question, "Where have all the creatures gone?" They have been investigating various species whose populations have declined, including Dall sheep, red-legged frogs, trees, puffins, and trout. By researching these organisms, students aim to identify potential causes of population changes. Families are encouraged to discuss with their children potential reasons for the decline in many species over the past 30 years.

Math – Ms. Bentil: Students will finish Unit 3 by solving percent problems and completing Portfolio Project 3: My Merch Shop. Following this, they will begin Unit 4, which covers Expressions (4A) and Equations (4B). In this unit, students will learn that letters can serve as "stand-ins" for numbers and that math operations are carried out in the same way. They will practice reading, writing, and evaluating expressions while developing and applying formulas. Ms. Bentil looks forward to an amazing 2025 with your students. Happy New Year!

#### GRADE 7

Language Arts – Ms. Neverosky sub for Ms. Locke-Jones: Students continue to work diligently on their National History Day (NHD) projects. Students are in the "build" phase of their projects. NHD Day is scheduled for Friday, January 17<sup>th</sup>. Families are invited to view the projects on the 17<sup>th</sup> from 12:30 to 1 pm before the early release.

**Science – Mr. Lohrman:** In January, students will learn how to read the periodic table and understand how an element's placement provides information about its structure and its ability to form compounds with other elements. Midway through January, the 8<sup>th</sup> grade students will return to science, and the 7<sup>th</sup> grade students will transition back to history with Mr. Ball. Upon returning to science, students will study the body systems and complete a project where they create life-sized posters illustrating how all the body systems work together.

**Math – Mr. White:** Students will continue to work on Unit 2B: Equations and Inequalities. They will solve linear equations by combining like terms and applying the distributive property. Additionally, they will explore solving and graphing inequalities.

#### GRADE 8

Language Arts – Ms. Kosmer: The big day is almost here—January 17<sup>th</sup>! Students are working diligently and are excited to present their National History Day (NHD) projects to the judges. They have conducted thorough research, crafted their unifying paragraphs, written their process papers, and are now assembling their presentations. Students may choose to create an exhibit, performance, website, or documentary. During the first two weeks of January, they will focus on building their presentations, which will be evaluated on their connection to the annual theme, Rights and Responsibilities, their effective use of primary and secondary sources, and the creativity and professionalism of their chosen format. This event celebrates their hard work, critical thinking, and passion for history. We can't wait to see the incredible projects they bring to life!

**Pre-Algebra/Algebra 1 – Mr. Edwards:** In January, students will begin a unit on General Functions. In this unit, they will develop their ability to represent, interpret, and apply functions to make sense of quantities in various situations and solve problems. Students will be introduced to new tools for understanding functions, including function notation, domain and range, average rates of change, and mathematical terms for describing key features of graphs.

**U.S. History – Mr. Ball:** Students are excelling as they work their way through the second quarter. After studying the politics of the early United States, they began to analyze the foreign policies of the first few presidents. Students explored the various foreign policy dilemmas the early United States faced and evaluated whether the presidents' responses aligned with George Washington's advice to remain isolated from European conflicts and affairs. The focus then shifted to the presidency of Andrew Jackson, where students assessed his impact on democracy in the United States. To close out the second quarter, they will study Manifest Destiny and the westward expansion.

#### **LEADERS GO PLACES**

#### **Empowering Middle School Leaders for Real-time Impact and Long-term Change**

Twelve years ago, a group of us at Hampstead Hill Academy, a Baltimore Curriculum Project (BCP) neighborhood conversion public charter school in South Baltimore, launched Leaders Go Places (LGP) with our middle school. The initial idea and early funding for the incentive-based program to encourage and empower 6<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> graders to focus on academics, personal development, and positive peer interactions originally came from The Living Classrooms Foundation.

A key component of each LGP gathering – circles, recognition ceremonies, and field trips – is the recitation of "My Five Promises," which we based on similar objectives at The Living Classrooms. LGP's five promises are:

- I will contribute to the common good.
- I will persevere.
- I will produce quality work.
- I will conduct myself with honor and integrity.
- I will advocate for myself and others.

I've helped lead LGP since the beginning, in addition to my full-time job as HHA's middle school academic coach. Prior, I taught middle school science at HHA for eight years before transitioning into the coach role.

#### **Empowering Middle School Students Through Leaders Go Places**

Our middle school incentive program, LGP, teaches students how to lead. We acknowledge and reward students for scholarship (grade point average or GPA, a new concept for middle schoolers), leadership (good behavior and attendance), and citizenship (community service).

These leadership qualities are critical for student development and the high school admissions process. We believe that every HHA middle school student has the potential to achieve a leadership level every quarter (or roughly every 45 school days). To be "on level", students must meet all three criteria in scholarship, citizenship, and leadership for that level:

Students also receive one merit for daily on-time attendance and one merit for displaying positive behaviors, like the Five Promises. If a student is tardy or has an unexcused absence, they lose one merit. Any negative behavior (conferences, restorative room referrals, detentions, or suspensions, also mean demerits.

We break down LGP data each quarter by race, gender, homerooms, and special services to analyze our results. Communication is vital to the program's success. We communicate positive and negative student behaviors with teachers and families through our ClassDojo app. Teachers share LGP Progress Reports with students half way through each quarter during a scheduled advisory period.

#### Creating Incentives for Adolescent Positive Behaviors and Goal-Setting

We sponsor an LGP recognition ceremony each quarter for students and parents to acknowledge and celebrate their progress in the program. Of course, with middle schoolers, it's all about the swag. Depending on the level and previous recognition, students receive special LGP-branded polo

shirts and fleece jackets, which they may wear as their HHA uniform, fun and practical items, and certificates. Each 6th grader gets an "H" varsity letter on which they pin their LGP pins that designates the levels. Students collect pins to track their levels.

HHA UPDATE - Leaders Go Places (LGP) motivates students to achieve rigorous academic goals while fostering a commitment to being active and engaged citizens beyond the classroom. During the first quarter, our students achieved an impressive combined average GPA of 3.67. However, LGP is about more than just grades. It's about building character and giving back to the community. One way this is accomplished is through the Community Circle. Each Friday, middle school students gather in the gym to review the LGP schedule and hear important announcements. The group reflects on the Five Promises and their significance. A powerful part of Community Circle is when students stand to share apologies and acknowledgments. It is inspiring to see middle school students publicly apologize to a classmate or teacher, or express gratitude to a friend or staff member for their support. These moments foster a sense of connection and strengthen the school community each week.

In January, students will continue their service-learning projects, which include writing cards and designing "happy mats" for the Cool Kids Foundation. For years, our students have created heartfelt cards for kids undergoing in-patient medical treatment at nearby hospitals. Through an expanded partnership, they now have additional opportunities such as making holiday ornaments for hospital decorations, crafting entertaining "happy mats" for cafeteria trays, and creating no-sew fleece blankets. This year, students also partnered with Sean's House, providing students the

chance to make bracelets for service-learning hours. These bracelets have been widely appreciated and even featured on Sean's House's social media.

Even with the challenges of middle school, our students continue to impress us as they strive to embody the Five Promises and "contribute to the common good" through their service projects. Middle school is a unique and transformative time, and our students are making the most of it. As a reward for their efforts, students who are "on-level" for Quarter 2 will be invited to Roundtop Mountain Resort for Snow Tubing on Friday, January 24th, after school. A completed waiver is required for participation. Students received the waiver before the winter break, and it must be returned by January 17, 2025.



### LATINO SELF-DISCOVERY THROUGH ART (AFTER SCHOOL CLUB FOR MULTILINGUAL LEARNERS)


