

MAKE SURE YOUR CHILD IS NOT ON THE DISTRICT'S CHRONICALLY ABSENT LIST

Any student absence for any reason, including excused absences, causes your student to miss valuable instruction time. Baltimore City Schools follows the State of Maryland requirements for reporting absences. If your child misses 10% or more of any portion of the school year, she/he will be put on the chronically absent list for that period of time. For example, if school has been in session 50 days and your child has been absent 5 days, that is 10% of the year so far and she/he would be put on the chronically absent list.

Although even excused absences count towards the chronically absent total, communication with the school is key. Every time your child is out, make sure your child's teacher knows by sending a note in Dojo. Please review the chart to fully understand when your child will be considered chronically absent.

YOUR TRUST MATTERS... A MESSAGE FROM PRINCIPAL HORNBECK

HHA has a fantastic reputation. Many families move to the neighborhood or stay instead of moving to the county because of our school. We are an anchor in Southeast. I'm always proud to say there are more than a dozen children of staff members enrolled, which is an indicator of the health of the school. While my own children, Holly and Tom, are grown, they are the most important people in my life. When you get ready to come to school each morning, you're not just getting your child to school on time. You are bringing us the most important person in your life for nearly seven hours. Whether you are a parent, grandparent, aunt or uncle, or guardian, there is no higher level of trust you place in anyone other than family. We understand and respect that trust and work every day to earn it and keep it.

STATE TESTING IS SCHEDULED FOR THE WEEKS OF MAY 12TH (ELA) AND MAY 19TH (MATH)



State MCAP is scheduled to begin in May. The week of May 12th is the reading assessment and the week of May 19th is the math assessment. Testing in grades 3 - 8 will take about 60-90 minutes each morning. The test includes open-ended written responses as well as multiple-choice questions. The multiple-choice questions ask students to select the best answer and then the next question asks them to select how or why they know their answer to the previous question is correct. Our students are as ready as any student in Maryland. Parents can help by making sure students are relaxed, rested and have a good breakfast on test days. Being present and taking the test on scheduled days with their class ensures that students do not have to make up the test and miss class later in May. Please email your questions to our testing coordinator Jen Shaffer at irshaffer@bcps.k12.md.us. Remember that breakfast is free to all students starting at 7:40 am in our cafeteria. On test days, students MUST be on time for the start of school by 8 am and be present every day to do their best.

BUDGET AND CLASS SIZE UPDATE

For SY26, HHA continues to have the funding for all staff plus three positions to support lower performing students. Our budgeted enrollment is about 860 students, but the reality is that there will be an actual (as opposed to budgeted) enrollment of about 930 students. There is no cap on enrollment in grades K - 8. Only in-zone students are currently being admitted due to overcrowding. The only out of zone students who are admitted are rising kindergarten siblings, which is allowed through September 30, 2026. Class size in next year's 3rd, 4th, and 8th grades will remain too large with around 36 students in three homerooms in each grade. There will continue to be pullout staffing for enrichment, talent development, special education services, English as a second language services, etc., which has the effect of reducing class size for certain subjects. There will continue to be full time assistant teachers in every PreK - 1 classroom, one dedicated para for 2nd grade students, and mentors in grades 2 - 4, which improves the staff to student ratio. There will also be six full-time substitute teachers on staff that enable us to never split classes up when a teacher needs to be out for an appointment or is sick. PLAYGROUND CAMPAIGN TO BEGIN

HHA is beginning a campaign to raise \$400,000 for a new playground. The playground will be as large as the old one with exciting new equipment. A solid soft rubber surface will run \$120,000 and around \$280,000 will be needed for amazing equipment to include slides, monkey bars, bridges, nets, climbing walls, and more. In terms of timing, the playground will be finished about 12 weeks from the date a contract is signed. Half of the cost is due at the signing with the balance due upon completion. We are in the process of looking for anchor and matching donors. Please see Mr. Hornbeck if you have funding ideas.

3RD QUARTER REPORT CARDS COMING HOME WEDNESDAY APRIL 2ND

Your child's 3rd quarter report card tells you how your child is performing in each subject. Make sure to note if any teacher indicates that your child is performing below grade level and/or is requesting a conference. If you want to schedule an appointment with a teacher, please send a note, message them on ClassDojo, or contact the main office at 410-396-9146.

MIDDLE SCHOOL PLACEMENT AND HONORS COURSES

HHA is the highest performing middle school in City Schools. According to the MSDE report card, we are in the 97th percentile in the State. Moving from 5th to 6th grade at Hampstead Hill Academy marks the transition from elementary school to middle school. This is an exciting milestone. At HHA, we seek to provide a joyful, safe, nurturing, diverse, family-friendly environment with rigorous, effective academic programs for every student. To that end, all students take honors classes. Middle school students receive honors credit for their work in English, social studies and science classes. In Math, students may be placed in an advanced class and tracked to take Algebra in 8th grade.

IS YOUR CHILD ON THE CHRONICALLY ABSENT LIST?

A student in Baltimore City is considered chronically absent when they miss 10% of any portion of the school year. Students been in school about 130 days, so any student missing 13 or more days at this point are chronically absent. Chronic absenteeism is slightly up this year currently sitting at 13% of our students who have missed at least 10% of the school year. Attending school is mandatory in Maryland. We can't teach your child unless they are present and on time. Chronic absence includes excused and unexcused absences. Please do not take vacation on school

2ND QUARTER PRINCIPAL'S LIST AND HONOR ROLL

Students at HHA who achieve the highest levels of performance are recognized on the Principal's List and Honor Roll.

- Students in 1st grade must achieve a grade of P with a 1 or 2 in all subjects to be recognized on the Principal's List.
- In grades 2 4, the Principal's List distinction recognizes students who achieve 90% or higher in all core subjects, with a 1 or 2 in conduct.
- In grades 2 4, Honor Roll students are recognized for achieving 80% or higher in all core subjects, with a 1 or 2 in conduct.

Students in grades 6-8 are recognized for their scholarship, leadership, and citizenship through the Leaders Go Places program. See the list of 2^{nd} Quarter Principal's List and Honor Roll students at the end of the magazine.

When one child has a fever or is throwing up, please send healthy siblings to school. Please get in the habit of sending your child to school. There are no remote learning options available. Teachers will not prepare work for when you may be traveling. Students will need to makeup work upon returning to school.

DON'T STOP IN THE STREET! ONLY CROSS AT CROSSWALKS!

You will notice Baltimore City Parking Enforcement officers giving tickets out in the morning and afternoon. Please avoid driving on the blocks surrounding the school from 7:45 - 8:15 in the morning and 2:40 - 3 in the afternoon. Park a block or two away and walk your child to school or pick up your child. This is a constant safety concern, especially with

construction. There has been a number of near misses by cars going around cars that are parked or stopped illegally in the middle of the road. Tickets for stopping in the lane of

traffic to let your child out or pick your child up are \$258. We have some very sad stories of parents and caregivers who have had to pay that fine. Plan ahead, park a block away, and walk to school. Officers will randomly monitor our school.

PREK

GRADE 3

Reading – Ms. Knudsen: Some groups have been learning about the elements of nonfiction texts, including headers, sub-headers, bolded text, and indexes. They have practiced using these features to preview their reading and locate answers to comprehension questions more efficiently. Additionally, students have developed test-taking strategies such as using T-charts, rough drafts, root words, and text evidence to help decipher new words. These strategies are incorporated into daily learning, and students are eager to apply them during the MCAP test. Other groups have completed a book series that follows characters Wendy and Sidney on their adventures through space and are now nearing the end of a series featuring Waldo, the animal trainer. Alongside these stories, students have read nonfiction informational texts about space and animals. They have also been practicing writing in complete sentences and using proper paragraph structure to craft well-organized responses.

Language/Science - Ms. Ahearn Jensen: Students have been working hard and making great progress! In science, they are exploring the topics of water and climate. As part of their learning, students have researched severe weather, created weather reports, and engaged in hands-on activities to deepen their understanding of weather patterns. Their enthusiasm and dedication to learning are truly commendable. Keep up the great work!

Math - **Mr. Bradbury:** Students have taken their math practice outdoors working on Unit 6 on Mass and Weight. They will now focus on topics such as time, money, capacity, geometry, and area/perimeter.

Ms. Smith: March was a busy and productive month. Students successfully completed the fractions unit and did an excellent job on the unit test. They are now working on measurement and will soon begin the next unit on telling time. In reading, students enjoyed *Beauty and the Beast* and celebrated with a watch party, complete with snacks, stuffed animals, and fun! After watching the movie, they wrote essays comparing the video and written versions of the story. Families are encouraged to remind their child to read and complete their SIR logs each week, as this practice helps strengthen reading and comprehension skills. After spring break, SIR logs will shift focus to non-fiction literature. In science, students are finishing the Water and Climate unit. Wishing everyone a wonderful and relaxing Spring Break!

GRADE 4

Reading – Ms. Conrad: Students continue to work hard and explore wonderful stories in class. The Crocodiles (Conrad) are currently reading the myth *The Golden Touch*. Students will

complete a portfolio project focused on the story's theme by creating a collage that represents a major theme and writing a well-structured paragraph with supporting details from the text. The Goldfish (Green) are reading *The Prince and the Pauper*. After finishing the book, students will create a comic strip summarizing the most important events and write a paragraph explaining a major theme with supporting details. Recently, they composed a letter from the perspective of the character Miles. The Sharks (Shortman) are reading *The Cruise of the Dazzler*. As they explore the novel, students are learning about figurative language and point of view. They recently wrote a letter from the perspective of the main character, Joe. Students are putting great effort into their reading and writing projects, and deepening their understanding of literature in creative ways.

Language/Science - Ms. Green: Students will begin energy investigations. They have mastered soils, rocks, and landforms and learned all about human and animal senses and body systems. This final unit includes plenty of work with circuits and energy transfers, which will be explored through engaging labs both in the classroom and outdoors. This month, parents and students will receive timelines and requirements for the end-of-year science fair. Everyone looks forward to see what 4th grade scientists discover in their independent research.

Math – Ms. Shortman: The Crocodiles and Goldfish will work on Unit 5: Unit Conversions, which includes adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing units, as well as converting between smaller and larger units. They will take the Unit 5 test in April. The Sharks will take the Unit 6 test on Decimals, which covers decimal place value, as well as comparing and rounding decimals. They will then move on to Unit 7: Decimal Operations, concluding the unit with a portfolio project. Also, a big shoutout to the Sharks for winning *Beat the Teacher* once again for the month of March! Keep up the great work!

GRADES 5 - 8 TEAM NEWS

GRADE 5

Reading – Ms. Pellegrini-Gaither: The Pandas are exploring a variety of texts, including From Plateau to Mesa to Butte, The Hopi Way to Life, Upon This Earth, and Breaking the Rules. The Robins and Owls have started the third unit of the SpringBoard curriculum, Changing Perspectives. In class, students are analyzing a variety of argumentative texts and discussing how authors use claims, reasons, and evidence. All students will begin to work on test-taking skills and strategies to prepare for the MCAP (Maryland Comprehensive Assessment Program), which they will take in May. Keep up the great work!

Social Studies – Ms. Ruppenthal: Students did an outstanding job on the MISA assessment in March! Since then, they have been reviewing key events leading up to the Revolutionary War, including the Boston Massacre, the Boston Tea Party, the Second Continental Congress, and the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Once this unit concludes, students will begin to explore civics and economics in early America. They will analyze historical events from multiple perspectives, considering the experiences of those who lived through this time period.

Math – Ms. O'Connor: Students have started Eureka Math Module 5: Addition and Multiplication with Area and Volume. In this unit, they have been learning to calculate the volume of rectangular prisms, cubes, and composite figures. To apply these skills, students are working on Volume Village, a project where they design various stores and businesses, each with unique volumes. Additionally, they are exploring how to find the area of rectangles with fractional side lengths and studying the properties of different geometric figures. Students continue to excel on IXL.com, having answered an impressive 183,505 questions this year! Keep up the great work!

GRADE 6

Humanities – Mr. Farber: Students are nearing the completion of *Bronx Masquerade* by Nikki Grimes. Soon, they will complete a short writing assignment in which they imagine a chapter in the book about themselves, writing both a brief narrative and an expressive poem. Next, students will begin reading *Bud, Not Buddy* by Christopher Paul Curtis, both in class and as part of their nightly homework. Additionally, they are preparing for the MCAP English test, which will take place in May. Happy Spring!

Science – Ms. Poole: Students are finishing the chemistry unit titled, "How Can I Smell Things from a Distance?" They have been learning about how odors are detected and how they form. To understand odors, students have been exploring the states of matter, as well as atoms and molecules. Quiz question: In which state of matter must an object be for it to produce an odor? Want to see if you're correct? Ask a 6th grade student for the answer! The classroom tower garden, affectionately named Herbert, has been producing an array of fresh lettuces. After harvesting, students enjoyed a salad bar featuring greens grown in the classroom. Stay tuned for future harvesting updates!

Math – Ms. Bentil: In April, students will continue to work through Unit 5 – Geometry and begin Unit 6 – Statistics. They will calculate the volume and surface area of three-dimensional figures. In Unit 6, students will graph data and calculate measures of center and variability. Families are encouraged to have students work on their IXL Skill Plans at home to reinforce classroom learning. Additionally, students should refer to the online notes in Google Classroom (under "Links") for homework support and to study for quizzes and tests. Looking ahead, weekly quizzes will continue on Fridays, and the Unit 5 test is scheduled for April 8th. Please ensure your student is reviewing regularly. Thank you for your continued support!

GRADE 7

Language Arts –Ms. Locke-Jones: Students have completed their 3rd quarter essays and should be proud of their growth and ability to write meaningful analyses. As 4th quarter begins, they will start their novel study of *Miracle's Boys* by Jacqueline Woodson.

Science – Mr. Lohrman: In the 4th quarter, 7th students are transitioning from history with Mr. Ball back to science. To begin the quarter, students will complete the physics IQWST unit, where they will learn how energy makes things happen. They will explore how energy converts from one form to another and is never created or destroyed. For example, the Sun's light rays are converted into chemical potential energy in plants, which humans then use to fuel their bodies. This energy is then converted into kinetic energy, or energy in motion.

Math – Mr. White: Students will begin to work in Unit 4B: Geometry. They will learn to calculate the area of two-dimensional shapes, such as triangles, circles, and trapezoids, as well as the surface area and volume of three-dimensional figures, including prisms, cylinders, and pyramids. Students will also solve problems involving composite figures by breaking them into simpler shapes. This unit helps build foundational skills for real-world applications in design, engineering, and problem-solving.

GRADE 8

Language Arts – Ms. Kosmer: Students are in the second half of *To Kill a Mockingbird*. They have been participating in literature circles, text-dependent questions (TDQs), and Socratic Seminars to analyze the chapters. To conclude the unit, they will complete a character chart and write a final essay. To prepare for MCAP, students are practicing test-taking strategies and working with short stories to review key 8th grade ELA standards.

Pre-Algebra/Algebra 1 – Mr. Pratta: Students will complete their final unit on quadratic equations and begin to prepare for the MCAP exam in May. In this unit, students will learn that equations in the form (x - m)(x + n) = 0 can be easily solved using the zero product property, which states that if the product of two factors is zero, at least one of the factors must be zero. When equations are not in factored form, students will practice rearranging them so that one side equals zero and rewriting expressions from standard form to factored form. As they progress, they will recognize that not all quadratic expressions in standard form can be rewritten into factored form.


US History – Mr. Ball: Mr. Ball is very excited to be back teaching 8th grade in 4th quarter! In April, students will learn about the various groups of Americans who moved west and explore what life was like in this part of the United States. They will also examine the Mexicano contributions to the West. After studying life in the West, students will shift their focus to the Era of Reform, analyzing how Americans sought to reform society in the first half of the 19th century. To conclude the month and the quarter, students will study the Civil War, examining its causes and the subsequent era of Reconstruction.

LEADERS GO PLACES

Middle school students finished another quarter incredibly strong! To achieve level status in the *Leaders Go Places* program, students must maintain a 3.0 GPA or higher, earn at least 80% on ClassDojo, and complete two or more hours of community service each quarter. These are high standards, and in the 3rd quarter, an impressive 78% of middle school students met the criteria! Look at the incredible averages in the table to the right.

They also completed more than 1,260 community service hours, and to top it off, 40 students earned the *Riser Award* for reaching a higher level in the 3rd quarter than in the 2nd quarter. Additionally, 18 students achieved a leadership level for the first time this quarter. This achievement reflects the students' commitment to producing quality work and putting in their full effort, even as the school year nears its end. That's an impressive number of middle school students reaching new heights! Take a look at how students performed at each level in the chart to the right. This is extraordinary work!



GIFTED AND ADVANCED LEARNING PROGRAM (GAL)

Passion Projects and Expert Projects

The GAL program is dedicated to creating learning opportunities that ignite curiosity, foster engagement, and instill a sense of agency—essential components in the development of gifted learners. One of the most effective ways to achieve this is through interest-based learning. During March and April, GAL students in grades 3 and 4 tap into their passions to design personal interest projects, allowing them to explore topics that excite them. Younger students in grades 1 and 2 also participate in activities that teach them how to become experts on subjects that spark their curiosity. Most students eagerly embrace this type of learning, quickly discovering that the journey of exploration can be just as rewarding as the final product. In addition to deepening their knowledge, they develop valuable life skills such as self-management, goal-setting, and organization. Grade 5 GAL students are currently engaged in an exciting project with Ms. Kelley Smith called "Jury Trials." Throughout April and May, they will learn about the judicial system, culminating in a thoughtfully planned and executed mock trial, where they will take on roles as representatives of either the prosecution or the defense. This hands-on experience provides a deeper understanding of the legal process while building critical thinking and public speaking skills.

SCIENCE OLYMPIAD TEAM



KNOW THE NO'S

- No gum at school. It is distracting and prevents students from reading aloud clearly.
- No smoking or vaping in or around school property. This is against the law on school property.
- No dogs allowed on school property
- No double parking or idling at drop-off and pickup. Double parking creates a dangerous situation, and you could get a \$252 ticket for double parking.
- No crossing in the middle of the street. Cross your child at the corner. Do not encourage your child to get to school by crossing in the middle of the street! This can be extremely dangerous for your child.
- Please remind your child, especially older children, that ball playing is not allowed in front of the school during school arrival and dismissal times. Also, ask them to be mindful of smaller children to avoid accidentally bumping them.

THE LEARNING CHANNEL- HOW TO TALK TO YOUR CHILD'S TEACHER: 5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW By Maria Trimarchi

Prepare - One of the best things you can do before talking to your child's teacher is to prepare. Think of it as a business meeting and you're bringing the agenda. Ask the teacher how they prefer to be contacted. Many teachers do use email but parents should take advantage of whatever the teacher has set up: email, phone, school hours, website, etc. Understand that many teachers don't have a lot of time for extra one-on-one meetings with parents, especially at the beginning of the year or during report card time, so using your agenda and keeping the conversation focused will truly help. Find a time that's convenient for both of you: not usually drive-by meetings during pick up and drop off times, in the middle of the day or in the grocery store. Be on time, be prepared with questions and stories, and walk away with a plan. Parents should expect teachers to be experts in their field but need to remember they're human too. Many teachers are also parents who've been on the other side of the table.

Trust - Having a positive relationship with your child's teacher can help your child be more successful in the classroom. Parents should expect their child's teacher to hold shared information confidential, and should be confident in discussing cognitive and social development, as well as family events, with him or her. Trust that even if you disagree or have different styles of communication, you both have a commitment to the child. Be fair, but in situations where you feel you don't have a parent-teacher partnership, or that the teacher isn't producing results, seek out the counsel of the school administration for tips or help.

Share - Just as you expect your child's teacher to share important events that happen during the school day, your child's teacher wishes you'd reciprocate. Mutual disclosure is important in this partnership. Share insights into your child's interests, needs, strengths and personality. If you have areas of concern, be honest about that with your child's teacher. Communication should be both positive and negative -- don't be afraid to share important events in kids' lives (such as divorce or a new sibling) but also remember to share the funny stories too. All these things can affect how your child's days go.

Be Informed - Informed parents know what's happening in the classroom. They know the teacher, the kids, the whole cast of characters and the rules of the classroom. Some of the easiest ways to stay informed about what's going on in the classroom is to read newsletters, the classroom's Web page and any notes sent home. And, of course, stay on top of your child's homework assignments. Teachers have varying levels of accessibility but all are accessible (some are available after school hours, some have been known to give out their home phone numbers). Keep informed and keep in touch.

Participate - In addition to being a well-informed parent, be a parent who participates. Make an effort to meet your child's teacher early in the year, if only to introduce yourself. Throughout the year you and your child's teacher will have opportunities to meet at parent-teacher conferences and school events -- be sure to attend all parent-teacher meetings as these are sometimes the only one-on-ones you'll have together. Ask what you can do to be involved. For example, being a volunteer for classroom activities is just another way to stay connected and informed. Accompany a field trip, join the Parent Teacher Organization (PTO), help organize a classroom party or donate time or resources to the classroom or grade.





ATTENDANCE

HHA is serious about attendance. Our talented staff cannot teach unless students attend school. There is a district-wide focus on student attendance. Again this year, there will be mandatory hearings at school headquarters for the parents of students with poor attendance. Each month, the news magazine will include this chart so students and parents can review monthly attendance data.
